

Mike D. Smith, Ph.D. is Director of the Council on Aging and Associate Director for Education and Community Services of the Sanders-Brown Center on Aging. He plans and directs educational programs related to aging, including the annual Summer Series on Aging, now in its 22nd year, and the Graduate Certificate in Gerontology.

Mike was awarded the M.A. and Ph.D. by Loyola University of Chicago, and the M.H.A. (Master of Health Administration) by Indiana University. He has published articles related to ethics and co-authored one book (The Professional Commitment: Issues and Ethics in Nursing, 1987). He has taught both health administration and philosophy, specializing in professional and organizational ethics and has served on the faculties of Xavier University, Edgecliff College, East Tennessee State University, the University of Notre Dame (adjunct), and currently the University of Kentucky (adjunct).

Before coming to Kentucky in 1999 to head the Alzheimer's Association, he was a healthcare executive in Indiana for 15 years, managing hospital operations and quality improvement, serving as liaison with the medical community, developing community-based collaboratives, and chairing a Committee for the Protection of Human Subjects in Research.

He serves on the UK Hospital Ethics Committee, on several steering committees related to older persons in the Lexington Fayette Urban County Government, on the Kentucky Statewide Bioterrorism Advisory Committee for the Kentucky Department for Public Health, and on the Kentucky Aging and Mental Health Coalition. He is co-principal investigator for Hope for Tomorrow, a pilot program to assist aging family caregivers in planning for their sons and daughters with lifelong disabilities, funded by the Retirement Research Foundation.
